Currently moving effortlessly between the disparate roles of the irascible "Vernon Gaines" in the hit NBC-TB series A Different World and the piano-playing "Winning Boy" in August Wilson's acclaimed play, The Piano Lesson, Lou Myers is an actor of uncommon versatility and range.

Myers' love of performing began while he was growing up in his native Charleston, WV, where he appeared in Sunday school, church and high school drama productions. After serving in the Air Force, he attended West Virginia State College, where he received a B.S. degree in sociology and was active in the drama department. In addition, he earned an M.A. in sociology from New York University.

Myers made his Broadway debut in the Negro Ensemble Company's production of The First Breeze of Summer. He received the Audience Development Committee's Audelco Award for his performance in the Off-Off Broadway production of Fat Tuesdau. He has also performed in August Wilson's Ma Rainey's Black Bottom (on Broadway) and Fences. Myers also reprised his role of "The Rev. Mosley" in the televised version of The First Breeze of Summer, and has guest starred on The Cosby Show.

Myers has toured throughout the Far East and Africa and to more than 75 United States College campuses with his one man cabaret act, Me and the Blues. He is the organizer and director of the Tshaka Ensemble, which has performed Greek tragedies and Shakespearean dramas in an African setting at universities and performing arts centers nationwide, including the Lincoln Center (NY) Out-of-Doors Festival.

Myers, a Los Angeles resident, enjoys—not surprisingly, in view of his *The Piano Lesson* role—playing the piano.
