




To the freshmen I shall but quote: "To you from falling hands we throw the torch; be yours to hold it high."





























Regardless of what we may think, there are always two people who will try to do what is best for us. Those two people are our parents, who have loved, guided, protected and provided for us since the first day of our lives.

The protection of which we are assured by our parents has been and will continue to be with us for the rest of our lives. That protection is with us at all times and at all places.




Nature stores new plant life in tiny seeds To make new growths to meet some of our needs Seeds often peep through the ground, And they grow by leaps and bounds.

NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY IN HISTORY

PURPOSE

Phi Alpha Theta is an honor society for students and faculty members of distinguished American colleges and universities interested the study of history. It should not be confused with Greek letter social fraternities, which are associations of men and women on an entirely different basis.

REQUIREMENTS

- 1. For undergraduate students: 12 semester hours in history, with grades in all history courses averaging above the second highest grade on the working scale (B in most institutions), and grades in two thirds of all other courses averaging the second highest grade: rank in upper 35% of the class.
- 2. For graduate students: completion of one third of the residence requirements for the master degree. The average in all courses for completed for graduate credit shall be at least midway between the highest grade in the working scale and no grade in the graduate record shall be "failure" or its equivalent.

Sigma Delta Pi was established on November 14, 1919, at the University of California in Berkeley, long a center of Hispanic studies. Beginning in 1921 chapters in other universities were formed and in 1925 when six chapters were in existence, it became a national honor fraternity. There are now fifty chapters active in the United States.

Fraternities and Sororities are subject to the supervision of the faculty, and for such supervision the following rules have been adopted:



Excess credit from secondary schools will not release a student from the requirement of residence.

NU CHAPTER OF ALPHA KAPPA ALPHA SORORITY

Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority was founded in 1908 on Howard University's campus by ten illustrious college women. It was the first Negro Greek Organization for women. They as college women realized the increasing complexity of women's problems and the necessity of forming an organization for the purpose of studying and solving such problems organized this Sorority. From this first chapter at Howard University, 106 undergraduate and 175 graduate chapters have been founded.

Some of the National projects of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority are: American Council on Human Rights, Foreign Fellowships and Undergraduate Scholarships, National Building and Chapter Houses, Research, and Local Community Programs.

Nu Chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority was established December 26, 1922, by one of our beloved founders, Soror Sara Merriweather Nutter of Charleston, West Virginia. It represented the first undergraduate Greek letter Sorority in West Virginia in the interest of Negro college women. Nu Chapter was the first sorority to win the Charleston-Institute Pan Hellenic Council Award for conducting the best all-around probation for the spring of 1952. Some of the projects of Nu Chapter are: The Well Baby Clinic, Swingtime, and AKA Scholarships.



Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity was founded December 4, 1906 at Cornell University in Ithaca, New York. The founders were Eugene K. Jones, Vertner W. Tandy, Nathaniel A. Murray, Charles H. Chapman, Robert H. Ogle, Dr. Henry A. Callis, and George B. Kelley. From these men has grown the first and the largest Negro Greek letter organization in the world. There are over 351 chapters, consisting of undergraduate, graduate, and intermediate chapters.

During the summer and winter of 1920, six students became associated with instructors of what was then West Virginia Collegiate Institute. Fraternity life at Institute was unknown to the student body up to this time. The narratives related by these youthful teachers motivated a desire within the minds of these students to strive for that which ruled supreme in the hearts of their elders. This interest resulted in the formation of a club followed by a request to the General Offices of Alpha Phi Alpha for a chapter of that fraternity at Institute. This request was rejected and it wasn't until December 23rd. of the following year that permission was granted for the establishment of an undergraduate chapter. Thus Alpha Zeta Chapter of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, the first fraternity at West Virginia State College, was born.

Of the many activities sponsored by Alpha Zeta, the annual "Top Hat Lounge," Mother's Day Program, and $A\phi A$ -AKA Prom are highlights.







The Omega Psi Phi Fraternity was founded November 17, 1911, at Howard University in Washington, D.C. The founders were three college juniors and a faculty advisor. They were Doctor Oscar J. Cooper of Philadelphia, Reverend Edgar A. Love, Bishop of the A.M.E. Methodist Church, Frank Coleman, and the late Doctor E. E. Just, advisor and Professor of Physics at Howard University. Chapters have sprung up from Roxbury, Massachusetts, to Seattle, Washington, until today there are more than 255 chapters.

Theta Psi Chapter of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity was founded at West Virginia State College on May 26, 1926. The six men who diligently worked toward the founding of the chapter were L. L. 




In Technical Science specific technical preparation of professional grade is outlined. In the more general work in Mechanic Arts emphasis has been placed upon individualized programs of study arranged to enable the student to take advantage of every facility to prepare for a teaching career.

Programs in Technical Science include the light building Construction Program, the Pre-Engineering Program, The Technical Science Program and the Terminal Technical Program of Two years.


Department of Music

The purpose of the music department is to give opportunity for an intensive and intelligent study of music and at the same time to establish ample opportunities for the development of other cultural interest. A comprehensive list of courses in the several fields of music instructions is offered to prepare students for such positions as church organist, choir-singers, accompanists, concert performers, and particularly teachers and supervisors of vocal and instrumental music in the public schools. The public school curriculum has a margin of electives which permits the student to meet the state requirements for teaching certain academic subjects as well as music.

The Department of Biology Offers:

- 1. Preparatory courses of medicine, dentistry, nurse's training, laboratory technique, pharmacy, veterinary medicine, embalming, social work, and teaching of Biology.
- 2. Preparatory and prerequisite courses for home economics, agriculture, physical education, art, etymology, biochemistry and physiology.



The Department of Mathematics aims first, to prepare all students by required and elective courses a sound background for a basic understanding of all the various sciences, second, to give prospective teachers a professional attitude, a strong subject matter foundation and adequate skills and techniques in the application and teaching of the material, and third to show students that mathematics is a living and vital science by seeing it applied to everyday life, not only in the classroom, but in the various fields of industry.

The program in education is designed to meet the needs of four classes of students: (1) those who plan to become elementary teachers; (2) those who plan to become high school teachers; (3) those who, having met certain special requirements, plan to pursue the Single Curriculum, the successful completion of which makes them eligible for certification to teach on either of the two levels: (4) those who do not plan to teach but wish to pursue as part of their liberal education courses which treat the scientific, philosophical and historical aspects of education. Courses in this department are not ordinarly open to students of freshmen and sophomore standing. The Institute grade school, and cooperating schools in other communities are used for observation and directed teaching.







The department is concerned with the total wellbeing of the individual student in a safe and healthful college environment. The department offers two majors:

(1) Health and Physical Education, and (2) Health Education.

The major curriculum in Health, Physical Education, and Safety aims to prepare students for graduate study in the field and for professional positions in elementary and secondary schools, clubs, municipal recreation centers, the YMCA and the YWCA, and other, social agencies. Types of positions available in the field include among others, the health and physical education teacher

and supervisor, the health and physical director, the athletic director, the recreation supervisor, the intramural director, the coach, the teacher-coach (junior and senior high school) and teaching combinations of physical education with health education, recreation, and related subjects. Fitness for the pursuit of this major field is characterized by ability to organize and to lead others in total-body activities, together with the possession of the ideals of sportsmanship and good living habits.

The major curriculum in Health Education aims to prepare students for graduate study in the field of school health education and public health education, for professional instructional positions in elementary and secondary schools, and as health coordinators in school, municipal and county units. Types of positions available in the field include among others, health instructor in elementary and secondary schools, school health coordinators, city and county school health coordinators, and apprentice positions as public health educators in public health agencies.

In regular season play the WVSC Cagers compiled a 9-7 Conference record and a 11-13 overall record. In addition to the victory over Morris Harvey, the Jackets also topped Alderson-Broaddus 75-74, 76-69, Norfolk State 74-73, 74-71, Salem 90-83, 96-91, Beckley 89-87, 78-74, Glenville State 71-70, and Bethany 82-73. 
Herb "Chili" Thompson of State went to the quarter finals in singles only to go down before Ace Champion Bill Kubry.
