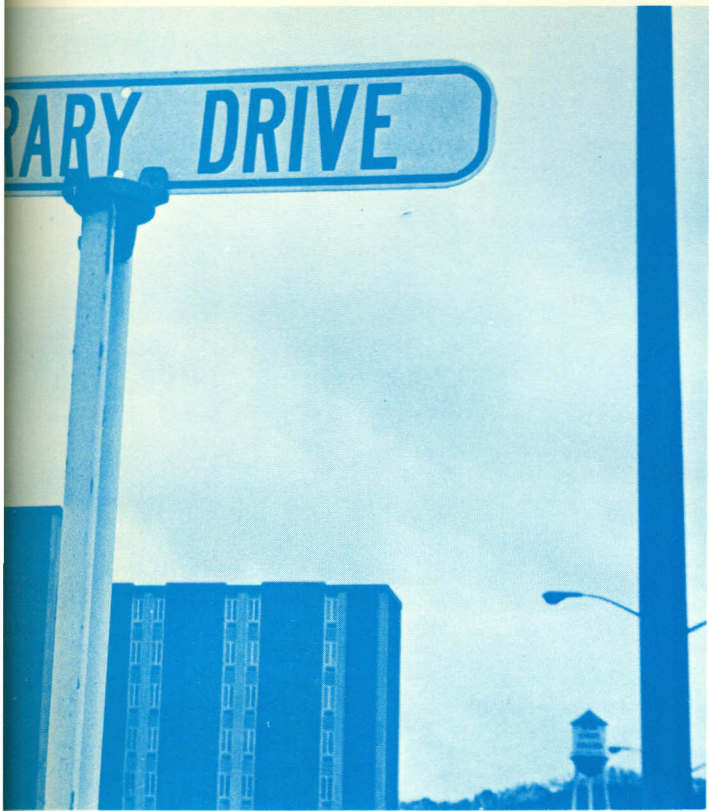


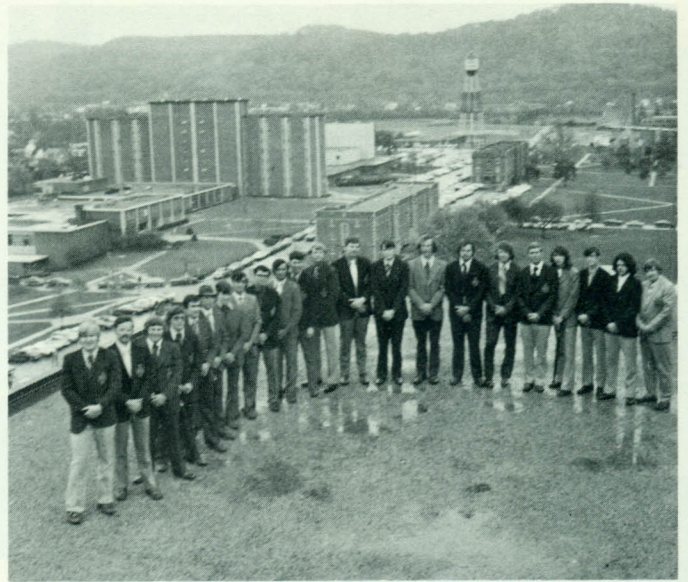














IN MEMORIAM



Garnett M. Mudd

My friends, today, we gather here to pay our last respects to one who has earned our admiration. Too often we wait until our commendations fall upon ears that cannot hear. However, to my mind, it is never too late to recognize true greatness in an individual. In our times, we are prone to give publicity, and to hear the publicity, and even seek the publicity about those whose actions are evil. We forget that we need to broadcast the accomplishments, the philosophies and attitudes of those who live exemplary lives; if for no more benefit than to try to impress the younger generation that, despite the frustrations, the evils, the unsolved problems of our society, there are many, many persons who achieve constructive lives.

Today, I speak for the West Virginia State College family. Garnett Mudd—or just Garnett as she liked to be called—was one of the key members of this family. She was a very efficient Assistant Professor of English; a very interested officer of the West Virginia State College Alumni Association; and a very active member of the Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority. In addition, she assumed responsibilities for numerous other tasks. Her job was teaching—teaching the language of our country—but she taught more than English—she taught love through her daily life—she taught sympathy in her reactions to people—she taught industry through her eagerness to work—she taught patience in her responses to the impatient thrusts of youth—she taught that life can be beautiful, without the aid of crutches to lean on—if only more of our young people could realize this fact—she

taught acceptance of the handicaps of life and working around them.

There are two quotations that I think that are particularly appropriate for this occasion. One of them is found in the Scriptures; I read the 31st through the 40th Verses of the 25th Chapter of the Gospel according to St. Matthew:

“31 When the Son of man shall come in his glory, and all the holy angels with him, then shall he sit upon the throne of his glory:

32 And before him shall be gathered all nations: and he shall separate them one from another, as a shepherd divideth his sheep from the goats:

33 And he shall set the sheep on his right hand, but the goats on the left.

34 Then shall the King say unto them on his right hand, Come, ye blessed of my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world:

35 For I was an hungred, and ye gave me meat; I was thirsty, and ye gave me drink: I was a stranger, and ye took me in:

36 Naked, and ye clothed me: I was sick, and ye visited me: I was in prison, and ye came unto me.

37 Then shall the righteous answer him, saying, Lord, when saw we thee an hungred, and fed thee? or thirsty, and gave thee drink?

38 When saw we thee a stranger, and took thee in? or naked, and clothed thee?

39 Or when saw we thee sick, or in prison, and came unto thee?

40 And the King shall answer and say unto them, Verily I say unto you, Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me.”

The 40th Verse contains the crux of the matter. Garnett Mudd served her fellow men; she served her God. The status of the person served had no bearing upon the service.

It is not necessary for me to detail the good deeds, the service performed and the gifts of time and interest that composed the life of Garnett Mudd. I am certain that many of you have been the recipients of the evidences of her love and affection. Only a few days ago, relatively speaking, her flowers and her smile encouraged me on the way to recovery from surgery.

The other quotation is Helen Steiner Rice's work, “Where Can We Find Him?” “Where can we find the holy one?

Where can we see His only Son?

The Wise Men asked, and we're asking still,
Where Can We Find This Man of Good Will?

Is He far away in some distant place,

Ruling unseen from His throne of grace?

Is there nothing on earth that man can see

To give him proof of **Eternity?**

It's true we have never looked on His face,

But his likeness shines forth from every place,

For **The Hand of God** is everywhere

Along life's busy thoroughfare . . .

And His presence can be felt and seen

Right in the midst of our daily routine,

The things we touch and see and feel

Are what make God so very real . . .

The silent stars in timeless skies.

The wonderment in children's eyes.

The gossamer wings of a humming bird,

The joy that comes from a kindly word . . .

The autumn haze, the breath of spring,

The chirping song the crickets sing,

A rosebud in a slender vase,

A smile upon a friendly face . . .

In everything both great and small

We see **The Hand of God in All.**

And every day, somewhere, someplace,

We see **the Likeness of His Face . . .**

For who can watch a new day's birth

Or touch the warm, life-giving earth.

Or feel the softness of the breeze

Or look at skies through lacy trees

And say they've never seen His face

Or looked upon His throne of grace!”

As Helen Steiner Rice points out, in our search for God, we can find Him in “The joy that comes from a kindly word”; from “A rosebud in a slender vase”; in “A smile upon a friendly face.”

These were some of the evidences of the way of life pursued by Garnett Mudd. I am certain that many persons have “Seen His face or looked upon His throne of grace”, through the life of Garnett Mudd.



Delegates were selected, from the classes, to attend the conference. They explored the true racial climate at our school, and found that there is contrary to popular belief, a great deal of racial tension.

There were those who spoke of Black Nationalism and an all Black WVSC. There were those who spoke of prejudice against the white students and the schools attempt to hang on to its black image despite its 85% white enrollment. There were also those who spoke of the absurdity of seeing people as black or white.

Suggests Possible Solutions

Students Blamed For White Change

Alberta Johnson, West Virginia State College freshman formerly of New York, said students she's talked with believe the school is turning into a "white" institution.

And if so, "It's your fault," she told black students at Wednesday's session of the week-long discussion, "The Living Lab: Eighteen Years Later."

She said she would blame students who "sit there and don't open their mouths" and black administrators who "sit and watch things go down that are against blacks" if the school totally gives up its blackness.

But to the whites, who she described as persons who attend classes and go home, the student said she didn't think they were "getting much for their money." And, she said she believes whites are money-conscious persons because "white people came in (to WVSC) to receive a cheaper education."

Addressing some of the 17 questions posed for answers this week, Miss Johnson said money is wasted bringing entertainment attractive to whites to campus because whites don't attend and blacks aren't interested.

Also, she said she fears a

white President at WVSC because "there might be another Bluefield (State) here." Another former all-black school, Bluefield has been the scene of racial violence.

To a question about interracial dating Miss Johnson only said, "Black and whites have been dating in this country since slavery."

And, according to her voluntary segregation exists even inside the classroom where black congregate in one corner and whites in another.

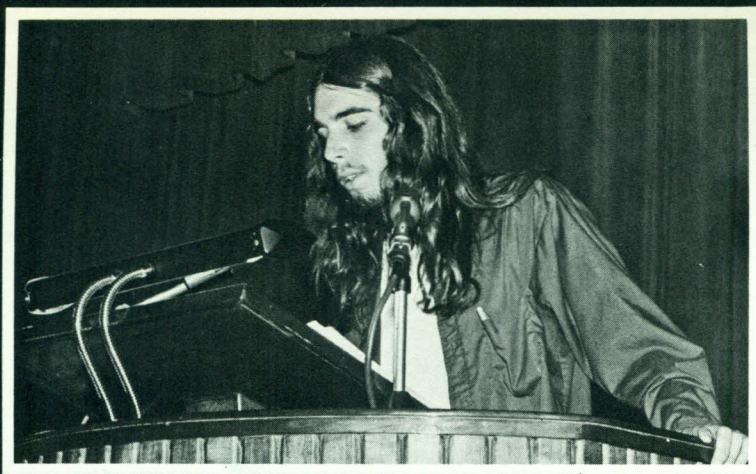
For solutions to problems connected with true integration at West Virginia State, the student said:

—It should be mandatory for every student to give a percentage of his time to "developing the school." If he takes three hours, he should be required to add an hour for this project.

—Cliques in classrooms should be broken by teachers.

—Teachers should go outside of their special teaching area and help students solve today's problems.

—The next WVSC president should be black to keep the state's group of college presidents integrated. And, he should be a "super-black."

'Self-Segregated' Tag Given WVSC

Speaking articulately but fast, Paul Bellotte said the community may take West Virginia State College's "living lab" title derisively, but in other areas of the state it is referred to as that "school."

Some even compare it to a large "high school," added the St. Albans freshman.

His own description is that WVSC is a "commuter school 75 to 80 per cent white where blacks are far from militant and both blacks and whites are apathetic."

He said students bring "imbred home prejudices" with them to school and self-segregate themselves in classes. He pointed out the cafeteria as "totally black" and said Student Council is all black but the whites "couldn't care less."

"Violence is not a problem" in Institute, but racism is so much a part of the college that people fight over the color of the next president's skin rather than his accomplishments, Bellotte accused.

The student believes education to be "the most effective tool" for changing mass attitudes but he can see no progress at West Virginia State because, "unfortunately, the majority of the students and faculty are racists and we only learn to hate professionally."

Its black history is important to the college, Bellotte continued, but added that it is no longer a "colored school."

"It shouldn't be a colored school. It shouldn't be a white school. It should be a people's school," he concluded.
