

#### West Virginia State College

One of the nation's 117 historically black colleges and universities, "State" underwent a transformation over the years from a predominantly black institution to one with a growing reputation as a "living laboratory in human relations."

Founded in 1891, it grew to a student population of 5,000, 88 percent white, 11 percent black and 1 percent Asian and other origins. The largest institution of higher education in the Charleston metropolitan area, it offered degrees in the arts, sciences, and professional studies as well as a variety of associate degrees geared toward transfer to baccalaureate programs.

Nestled on an 85-acre campus with 29 buildings, West Virginia State College, located in the Appalachian foothills along the Kanawha River, offered bachelor of arts degrees with majors in art, economics, English, history, political science, psychology and sociology. The bachelor of science degrees were offered in biology, business administration, chemistry, communications, criminal justice, mathematics, recreation and social work.


#### Campus facilities - "the Best"

The college's Drain-Jordan Library had over 180,000 books and a computerized catalog system. Computer laboratories and computerequipped classrooms were available in almost every discipline. Campus facilities included an art gallery, music studios, two theaters, science laboratories, radio and television studios, a foreign language laboratory, an electronics laboratory, an occupational resource center and a drafting laboratory. A gymnasium, swimming pool, football stadium, track, tennis courts and a baseball field were available for instructional and recreational use.

### LOOKING TO ITS ROOTS


West Virginia State College looked to its roots as it celebrated the anniversary of one of its oldest programs. 1992 marked the 100th year of the school's military science program and the 50th year of the Reserve Officer Training Center based at the college, two programs which since have merged.

134 cadets were in the program preparing to be Army officers. Approximately one quarter of the cadets were women.

"When the program first began, it was mandatory for all males to take it their first and second year," said Lt. Col. Willie Lucas, ROTC director. That rule remained until the 1970s. Also, the program, which previously trained only artillery officers, prepared cadets for all areas of the military. "ROTC is very much reflective of the changes in the military," reported Lucas. Although the army wasn't originally concerned as to whether students actually completed college degrees, today it requires them to graduate to enter the army as second lieutenants. "Education has been the big push," Lucas said.






# The "Best" Snow BLIZZARD OF '93

### Carter entered fifth year

Dr. Hazo Carter, Jr., entered his fifth year as president of West Virginia State College. Dr. Carter's career in higher education included positions of executive assistant to the president, assistant vice president for student affairs, and vice president for student affairs at Norfolk State University. Prior to assuming the presidency at WVSC in 1987, he served for four years as president of Philander Smith College.

Dr. Carter also served as chair and vice chair of the Advisory Council of Presidents of the State College System and secretary of the WV Association of College and University presidents. Dr. Carter co-authored several articles in academic journals, and he received the highest award given by Tennessee State University in recognition of his outstanding service and achievements in the field of education.

Heading the royal court for West Virginia State College's homecoming in October was "Miss State," Nakpongi Reeder and "Mr. State," Collin Daley.


Reeder was a 21 year old junior criminal justice major from Detroit. She was a member of the Student Activities Council, and she participated in intramural bowling and softball.
